

An Overview of DMFs: in Numbers

- Among the States, Odisha has collected the highest amount over INR 7779 Cr. i.e. over 25.24% of the total fund collected in the country. It was followed by Jharkhand with INR 4443.4 Cr., i.e. 14.4% of the total amount collected till Jul 2019.
- The top 5 states (Odisha, Jharkhand, Chhattisgarh, Rajasthan, and Telangana, respectively) collected amount over 72% till July 2019.
- The utilization rate for DMF fund was highest for Chhattisgarh with 66.22%, followed by Uttar Pradesh (58.85%), Maharashtra (46.45%), Jharkhand (42.51%), and Madhya Pradesh (37.4%) in terms of total amount allocated till July 2019.
- Chhattisgarh sanctioned the highest number of projects i.e. 31263 and also among them 19593 projects were completed, the highest in completed projects by any State till July 2019.
- Education and Drinking Water Supply together accounted more than 57% of number of projects under High Priority project areas, and Physical Infrastructure and Energy and Watershed Development together accounted more than 87% in other Priority Areas projects.
- In terms of amount spent in high priority areas, Education, Drinking Water Supply and Health Care together accounted about 72%, among which Education had the highest share of 32.78%, i.e. about INR 1885 Cr.
- In terms of amount spent in other priority areas, Physical Infrastructure accounted the highest share with 72.35%, i.e. about INR 2409.80 Cr., (the highest focused and invested project theme followed by Education in DMF). It was followed by Energy and watershed development with 10.3% in total amount spent in other priority areas.
- State-wise the focus for project theme changes however; major focus has been around only Education, Drinking Water Supply, Health Care and Physical Infrastructure over the years of DMF notified.

District Mineral Foundation (DMF) – An Overview

Minerals in India are jointly regulated by the State and the Central Governments. The Constitution of the country gives powers to the state to regulate and tax the mineral resources within its boundaries subject to any law passed by the Parliament in public interest. The Mines and Minerals Development and Regulations (MMDR) Amendment 2015 stated that State Govt. to establish District Mineral Foundation (DMF) at district level, as per section 9B, that will be used for development of people and areas affected by mining operation, as on 27th Mar 2015.

On 16th Sep 2015, Government launched Pradhan Mantri Khanij Khsetra Kalyana Yojna (PMKKKY) which will be implemented under DMF. Directions were issuedunder section 20A of the MMDR Act to all State to incorporate PMKKKY into rules framed for DMF. As per the directions and guidelines by the government, 21 mineral rich states have notified the DMF as of September 2019.

Objectives of DMF


The main objective of DMF is to work for the interest of the benefit of the persons and areas affected mining related operations. The two types of affected areas were identified; which are:

- **Directly affected areas:** These are the areas where the mining operations (excavation, blasting, mining, beneficiation, waste disposal, etc.) actually occur. These areas could include:
 - o Areas where mining operations take place (across villages, districts, states)
 - o Areas within a specific distance from a mine, as determined by the state government
 - o Villages where the resettled population is present
 - o Villages which depend on mining areas for their economic needs, and have traditional rights over the project areas
- Indirectly affected area: These include areas which have experienced adverse socio-economic changes due to mining operations such as deterioration of environment, degrading water, soil and air quality, reduction in stream flows and depleting groundwater resources and an increased burden on existing physical infrastructure, amongst others.

As per the objective, each DMF notifying state has to follow the rules as per the guidelines of PMKKKY scheme.

- (a) To implement various developmental and welfare projects/programs in mining affected areas, and these projects/programs will be complementing the existing ongoing schemes/projects of State and Central Government
- (b) To minimize/mitigate the adverse impacts, during and after mining, on the environment, health and socioeconomics of people in mining districts, and
- (c) To ensure long-term sustainable livelihoods for the affected people in mining areas.

Utilization of funds

The PMKKKY guidelines on the utilization of funds state the following:

- At least 60% of the funds collected must be used for high-priority area such as:
 - o Drinking water supply
 - o Controlling environmental pollution
 - o Healthcare
 - o Education
 - o Welfare of women and children
 - o Skill Development
 - o Sanitation
- Up to 40% of the funds may be used for other priority areas such as:
 - o Physical Infrastructure
 - o Irrigation
 - o Energy and Watershed Development
 - o Any other measures to improve environmental outcomes in the area
- Administrative expenses should not constitute more than 5% of the total budget. (Pradhan Mantri Khanij Kshetra Kalyan Yojana, 2015)

Operation and Governance of DMF

DMF is a trust set up at district level and acts as a non-profit body and follows 2-tier mechanisms for effective administration in all states, except Andhra Pradesh and Telangana.

DMF Administration 2-tier Mechanism

DMF as Trust in District

Governing Council (GC)

- 1.People Representative or Stakeholder Representative or key members of District Administration
- 2.GC can have officer s along with MP, MLA, welfare officer, Pollution Control Board, five representative of mines association, five communities representative of mining affected area, two representatives of mines workers, NGO working in mining fields, technical person working in mining.

Managing Committee (MC)


- 1. Chaired by District Collector or District in-charge minister with members from various departments in the District Administration.
- 2. MC can have good representation of PWD, PHED, WRD, Rural Development, Mining, Tribal Development, Forest, Medical & Health, Account Officer, etc.
- 3. Meeting of managing committee should take place at least once in 2 months.

- Telangana has amended the guideline and has set up single committee as District Mineral Foundation Committee (DMFC) as a single unit clubbed for GC and MC. DMFC has District Minister as Chairman; PD DRDA as Member Treasurer and Collector as Member-Secretary.
- In addition to the GC and MC, some of the state government has also constituted State Level Committee to monitor the DMF amounts spent at district level, to interact with the District officials for policy framework and to guide overall management of the Trusts of all districts of the states.
- Six State level committee have been formed in Andhra Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Gujarat, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan.











Estimated Percentage of Total Amount Allocated under High Priority Areas, India, till July, 2019

Estimated percentage of Total Amount Spent under High Priority Areas, India, till July, 2019


% of Total Amount Spent under High Priority Areas, India, till July 2019


% of Number of Projects under Other Priority Areas under DMF, India, till July 2019






Estimated Percentage of Total Amount Sanctioned under Other Priority Areas, India, till July 2019
